We are in the middle of a very active fall, which will lead to a very active winter, which will lead to a very active spring. I am always amazed by how busy it gets around here when the calendar turns to November. This is particularly true this year. Between "Winter Storms", nor'easters, and all the other things which have hit us recently, there seems to be very little time for the "normal" things which we do. But with all this activity in our lives, I would like to ask one question: "Why do we do the things we do?"

This question has very important implications for members of Prospect United Methodist Church. The gospel lessons for this time of year remind us that God loves us—really loves us! God loves us so much that God sent Jesus to share our human experience and to take upon himself the worst afflictions that our world could conceive. We are reminded that Jesus did this willingly, because of grace, God's spontaneous love poured out for us all.

This message is actually at the heart of the Protestant Reformation and it is the core message of our faith. We don't earn God's love and we don't get points for good behavior. God has not worked out a pay for service program based on our acting in a prescribed set of actions. It simply is grace.

To get to the point, we do not do things to earn our way into God's good graces; the good acts that we do is a response to the love God has already shared. When we realize that, in spite of our imperfections, God loves us with a love too deep for words, we are liberated to reach out and love others as God has loved us. We don't do it to earn anything from God; we are transformed by what God has done for us in Jesus. It is, actually, a rather simple concept that is very difficult for humans to accept.

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During the past few weeks, we have been made aware of people who are in need. Our neighbors along the shoreline, Long Island, New York City and New Jersey, are struggling to put their lives back together. They need our help. And so we can help, not because of the rewards we get, but simply because they are our sisters and brothers. Not out of fear or out of a need to placate God, but out of the love that is already at work in your soul. There is much to be done in our Conference and our world. Yet, the work will be easy when you remember why we do it.

PROSPECT IN EARLIER DAYS

President Taft's Visit To Prospect/Part 3 - Kathy Dube



This is the final in a 3-part series on the visit of former President William Howard Taft to Prospect Church in June of 1917, to bolster the Red Cross as well as America's entry into WWI. Around 2,000 people packed the church both within and outside, according to The Bristol Press write-up of the event.

President Taft alluded to the sinking of the Lusitania by German U-Boats despite the "Rights of Neutrals" accommodation on the high seas. "Germany brought us to a position where we either had to submit or to stand up and fight and we chose to do the latter. We are now in the war and ... in a position to lose a million men."

Mr. Taft continued, "... the Pacifists have pointed out that it may be possible to lose a million men for the sake of avenging the death of 200 (among the 1,198 lost in when the Lusitania sank). This wasn't the point. It is the moral and political principle that we are defending by our entry into the war. We are in it because ... we were forced into it. There was no other course to take."

He paid tribute to the "self-restraint and tolerance" exhibited

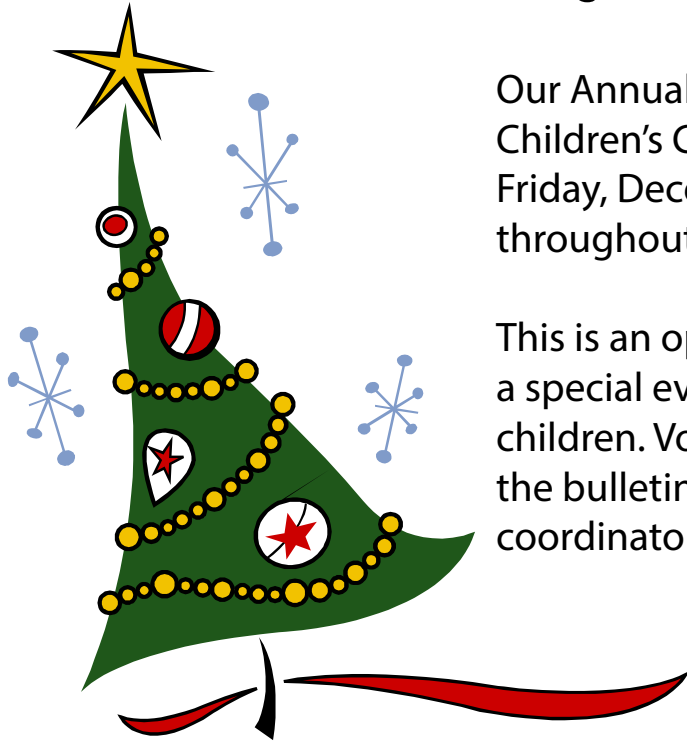
by President Woodrow Wilson the last two years.

"No matter what criticism was hurled at the President during that time, we are all behind him now." This comment brought loud applause. He described at length the system of government which had held sway over the German people in recent years: "The philosophy of the Divine Right of the Emperor and the militarism had been taught from the primary schools through the colleges so that this false idealism had been instilled into the minds of the people making them materialistic and wiping out all of their moral sense."

President Taft was perhaps the most significant guest ever to speak at Prospect Church.

An interesting sidelight: On the jump page to the story, on Page 2 of The Press, a headline noted that a Bristol man had been chosen for the jury in the upcoming trial of Mrs. Amy Archer-Gilligan, whose story inspired the play and movie "Arsenic and Old Lace." Also known as "Sister," Amy Archer-Gilligan of Windsor ran several nursing homes. She was a serial killer who murdered from five to 48 people by poison, including her second husband.
