### Pastor's Page

#### IN BETWEEN

#### Happy New Year!!



In the beginning of 2017, I shared with you that the reason January is cold is that God wants us to be alert and awake when we start a new year, especially right after the hype of holiday seasons. The last few weeks were too cold to wake. Sometimes I felt a headache when I went outside. God might have changed his thought. We are entering another new year and new beginning even before the sense of achievement from last year has vanished. We think we have already achieved something, but we are already in a start line. Our lives are always placed in endless repetition between beginning and end.

Paul Tournier, a Swiss physician and author, describes the experience of being in between — between the time we leave home and arrive at our destination; between the time we leave adolescence and arrive at adulthood; between the time we leave doubt and arrive at faith; between the time we leave sin and arrive at holiness; between the time we leave home on Sunday morning and arrive in church with the company of God's people; between the time we leave the works of the law and arrive at Justification by Faith. It's like being a pilgrim: we are on the way; in the middle of a way; we are in the process. So some people compare our lives to a pilgrimage, a journey which is an experience of being in between.

Paul says in Philippians 3:12-14:

*Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal but press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.*

Paul compared pilgrimage to a race. Paul says he presses on to run the race with perseverance. He has not obtained anything and has not already arrived at the finishing line, but he is not disappointed or frustrated. He is not in a hurry. He is not impatient. He rejects taking a shortcut. He decides to run, just run, just fix his eyes on Jesus. He just keeps walking the road and running the race.

However, the world whispers, "Why bother? There is plenty to enjoy without involving yourself in all that. The past is a graveyard — ignore it, the future is a holocaust — avoid it. There is no payoff for hard work, there is no destination for pilgrimage." So we are sometimes lost or get bored or lose interest or get demotivated.

We are in the new beginning of 2018. Now we are in between 2018 and 2019. We might listen to what the world whispers and follow the current without any effort or might not feel anything new or hopeful. On the contrary. We might keep running toward the goal God has for you. There is a saying that if you feel you are going through hell right now, then keep going. Keep going. It is up to you to choose what to do in between. What is your choice when you encounter a new year full of excitement, wonders, and maybe some surprises and unexpected events?

### ■ Souper Bowl of Caring Celebrates 28 Years of Giving and Serving



It is projected that 110 million people will be tuning in to watch the 52nd Super Bowl game on Sunday, February 4th, while nearly 50 million Americans will be struggling with hunger. Souper Bowl of Caring gives people the chance to help those who are in need and to think of those who do not even have a bowl of soup to eat.

This year marks the 28th anniversary of the first Souper Bowl of Caring, when 22 churches in Columbia, SC raised \$5,700 for local hunger-relief charities. Since then, young people have rallied schools, churches, businesses and community leaders to work together to raise over \$106 million. Like in 1990, Souper Bowl of Caring has remained true to the first collection: 100 percent goes to the charity each group chooses. PUMC donates its collection to Zion Lutheran Church's food pantry.

Please bring your cans of soup or other nonperishable food items to worship on Sunday February 4th!

### ■ Share the Warmth

Every month PUMC brings scarves to a park or a shelter. The hope is that this small act will provide some much-needed comfort to those who need it most over the winter months.



### ■ Family Promise

Host congregations serve as the foundation for Family Promise of Central Connecticut by providing overnight lodging and meals for three to five families (up to 14 people) for one week every two to three months on a rotating basis.

Support congregations are those that may not have the facilities or volunteer capacity to house guests but still want to participate. They provide volunteers to stay overnight at the host church, to prepare meals, or to set up and transport cots.


### ■ Book Of The Month
