Methodist Milestone Observed By NYAC

June 17th, 2019 was the 230th anniversary of the first sermon preached by Jesse Lee, regarded as the "Apostle of Methodism" for opening New England to the teachings of John Wesley. Many Methodist churches in New England trace their roots to Jesse Lee and two Connecticut churches are named for him, Jesse Lee UMC of Easton and Jesse Lee UNC of Ridgefield, both established in 1989.

At the recent NYAC Annual Conference held early in June, the Commission on Archives and History celebrated the 230th anniversary of Jesse Lee's first sermon in New England, preached in Norwalk, CT, under an apple tree on June 17th, 1789. The Archives released a pamphlet on the pioneer of Methodism at Annual Conference.

The pamphlet states that Jesse Lee, born in Prince George County, VA, in 1758, "was a charismatic individual, standing more than six feet tall and weighing 250 pounds. He traveled with two horses, riding one and leading another so that he always had a fresh mount. Lee had a deep sonorous voice, speaking with authority and assurance as he delivered his gospel message. Despite his prominence, there are no contemporary portraits of Jesse Lee. No painting. No print. No likeness."

He had minimal education but became an accomplished singer after attending singing school. At the time he joined a Methodist Society in 1774, there were said to be only 100 Methodists in the still young country. He first preached in a traveling circuit through Virginia, Maryland and North Carolina (Cont. to Page 2)

for five years, but in 1780 he was drafted into the Revolutionary War. Lee, a pacifist, refused to bear arms, and instead did service work and preaching, before an honorable discharge after three months of service.

He made a strong impression on Methodist pioneer and Bishop Francis Asbury after meeting him in 1785. After preaching in Norwalk, he helped form circuits on both sides of the Connecticut River. Heading to an annual conference in New York City in October 1790, Lee wrote in his iournal: "It is now sixteen months and eight days since our last Conference; and in this time, I have traveled several thousand miles, and preached in six states, and in chief part of the large towns in New England. In most places I have met with a kinder reception than I could have expected, among persons holding principles so different from mine, ..."

Impressed with his zeal, later in life Bishop Asbury said of Lee, "The time was, when if I said in the Conferences, I want a Preacher to go to Boston or Maine, Jesse Lee would respond, 'Here am I; send me."

Unique Ties to Both "Eldest Churches" in New England

Prospect's Pastor Emeritus, Rev. William Barnes, served as pastor of Jesse Lee United Methodist Church, Easton, which is in Fairfield County near Bridgeport, from 1968-1977. During his time there the History and Archives Committee of the Annual Conference declared that the Easton Church was the "Oldest Methodist Church in New England," having been founded as a Methodist "society" in September, 1789, as a result of Jesse Lee's preaching there that summer. The folks at Easton were rather proud of the designation and frequently used the term, "The Oldest Methodist Church in New England" in their literature and publicity.



To the chagrin of the Easton church and its Historical Committee, however, the designation did not go unchallenged. Because the Lakeville United Methodist Church, in the Lakeville section of Salisbury in the northwest corner of the state, also laid claim to being the "Oldest Methodist Church in New England," having been founded three months earlier, they claimed, in June, 1789, "During the Lifetime of Methodism's Founder, John Wesley," as the signboard in front of the church proclaims.

Lakeville's historical committee traces its church's founding to the preaching of another well-known early Methodist itinerant preacher, George Whitefield, who was also an emissary of American Methodism's first Bishop, Francis Asbury, and who founded churches mostly in communities along New York's Hudson Valley. During springtime, 1789, Whitefield briefly visited and preached in northwest Connecticut, including in Lakeville.

Ironically, during the early years of Pastor Bill's retirement, he was invited to serve as Interim Pastor at the Lakeville Church, a position he filled from 2003 to 2008. So he has been the pastor of both of the churches claiming to be the "Oldest Methodist Church in New England." To the question that his colleagues sometimes put to him asking which of the two claims is correct, he generally responds, "it depends on where I am asked the question!"

Pastor Bill looks forward to filling in for Pastor Kim at the service on Sunday, July 28th, 9 a.m., and hopes to see many Prospect friends that morning. He will speak on some of this interesting Methodist history and on that of Prospect Church as well, in his sermon, "Hearts Strangely Warmed — Our Methodist Heritage."
