Out of Comfort Zone

"Am I dying?" That was the first thing that I heard from my first patient visit during my Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) program. As you know I did an internship as a chaplain at St Francis Hospital. The patient I first visited thought a pastor would be



needed only when there was bad news. Some other patients asked me who I was and what I was doing in their room even if I introduced myself as a chaplain and a pastor. It was an eye-wide-opening experience.

A patient usually does not expect someone to visit him or her. You are sick or get injured and are lying on a bed in a cloth which only covers a part of your body. Then someone who is totally strange to you walks into your room and asks some questions like, "How are you?" "How do you feel?" Do you feel like having a deep conversation with the person who is not even a doctor or a nurse. Some patients directly expressed their uncomfortableness. Some just kept saying, "I am fine," which means please leave my room.

I as a chaplain was a total stranger to patients. In a church people have an idea who I am, what I am supposed to do and why I am talking to them. Even if they are new to a church, they are ready to encounter me as a pastor. That has been very comfortable to me and an advantage for me. But in a hospital setting, everything was totally different even if I was using same relational skills I am used to at a church. For the first couple of weeks it was so difficult to walk in and to try to talk with a patient. Nurses there looked so scary to me that I could not even talk to them. Then during a conversation with my supervisor, I realized that I have confined myself within a church setting. It has been comfortable to just deal with people within a church.

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I witnessed people's facial expression or attitude changing whenever I introduced myself as a pastor. Some people felt uncomfortable with a pastor being around them because they thought I would try to convert them. Some people thought a pastor would be a hypocrite. So I just did not want to bother people. Whenever I was outside of church, I tried not to reveal who I was. I just tried to be one of them. but during CPE program I felt I limited myself within a church setting.

I need to get out of my comfort zone. CPE training kind of liberated me from myself. Near the end of the training, I felt more comfortable with myself as a chaplain and as a pastor regardless of what people thought I was. I became natural in talking with a stranger. I felt something new inside of me. In September everything gets ready for another year. This September will be my fourth one here in Prospect UMC. I am so grateful to you for your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service, and your witness for our church as well as your support for me for the last three years.

I believe we have gradually been growing. But we are not going to be complacent. We are going to keep getting out of our comfort zone and to keep growing and thriving.

Days for Girls Update

The Prospect UMC Days for Girl project, part of an international movement empowering women and girls worldwide through sustainable menstrual care and health education, will resume in September. According to Carol Rivard, PUMC coordinator, the team will be taking orders for apple and pumpkin pies for the holidays beginning the first of September in Sessions Hall. Mary Ann Stroup at the Ct Chapter of DFG reports that from January

through July the Connecticut program donated 879 shields, 302 bags, 2,835 liners and 227 transport bags. All of the supplies were boxed and shipped to Kenya at the beginning of August. Mary Ann and her team will meet up with the ship later in September. She notes: "It takes about two months to arrive on the coast of Kenya. Thank you again for all you do to help this mission. Many hands make light work. May God Bless you all." Carol Rivard adds, "Well done ladies."

■ Forum Set on Disaster Preparedness

Prospect UMC is hosting a Disaster Preparedness Forum on September 28th. The forum is is open to all church members and friends in the Conference. PUMC is one of three sites where Rev. Tom Vencuss, Coordinator of Mission Ministries for the NYAC, will conduct the forums. Hours are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Training and workshops will include: Early Response Training (ERT) Basic and Recertification; Care Teams, including Disaster Emotional and Spiritual Care; Connecting Neighbors; Basic tool use and safety; and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), including the emergency telephone #211. Most every town in Central Connecticut has CERT team, including Bristol. CPR may be another worship offered.

Jill Wilson, who has gone on

many mission relief trips, said Connecting Neighbors is perhaps the most applicable to our church and community in the event of a disaster. The Connecting Neighbors curriculum helps churches assess their vulnerabilities, their ability to respond, conduct safety surveys, have an action plan on what to do if there is an active shooter in church, local church responsibilities, etc.
