

History Corner

PROSPECT IN EARLIER DAYS ~ *Kathy Dube* *Methodist Ties To Growth Of Country/Part 2*



Last month's "Prospect In Earlier Days," taken from the 1938 Mid-February Prospect Tower, highlighted the connection between the growth of Methodism and our new country after the War of Independence. Specifically, two bishops and two ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as our denomination was known then, gave the first blessing to George Washington and officers of the Republic within a month of his inauguration.

The Tower article next related General Conference ties to President Abraham Lincoln. The General Conference of 1864 sent a committee of five to Washington, D.C., to assure support for President Lincoln. Lincoln responded in a letter, in part, that read: "Notably sustained as the government has been by all the churches, I would utter nothing which might, in the least, appear invidious against any. Yet, without this, it may fairly be said that the Methodist Episcopal Church, not less devoted than the best, is, by its greater numbers, the most important of all. It is no fault in others that the Methodist Church sends more soldiers to the field, more nurses to the hospital, and more prayers to Heaven than any. God bless the Methodist Church -- bless all the churches -- and blessed be God, Who, in this our great trial, giveth us the churches." ~ A. Lincoln, May 18, 1864

■ **2016 Annual Conference**

The New York Annual Conference is slated to take place at Hofstrah University on Long Island from June 8 through 11. Jill Wilson will attend to help process health kits being collected throughout May and Dave Corey will drive the kits to the warehouse in Mechanicsburg, PA. Tim Krauss will attend as a delegate from PUMC .

■ Health Kit Collection Month

Health Kits are collected annually by our New York Annual Conference (NYAC) as a tangible mission outreach program. May is the time to bring your kit to church. Last year, our conference collected 3,500 kits which were taken to Mission Central, in Mechanicsburg PA.

Jill Wilson, who has gone on several mission trips in recent years and now chairs the NYAC's Conference Council on Mission, explains that Mission Central is a mission warehouse that serves as an outreach resource for disaster response, mission outreach and mission education and part of the UMCOR relief network.

"They are in constant need of supplies so our donations are a way to keep them stocked," she adds.

"We will accept Health Kits until June 1. Look for the collection bin in Sessions Hall. They will then be taken to Annual Conference at

Hofstra in June, and taken from there to Mission Central. Mission Central volunteers will process the kits for distribution around the world. Proverbs 3:27 "Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in your power to act."

Jill is going to be at Conference to process the Health Kits, participate in the Friday night Mission Celebration, and talk to people about Covenant Relationships with our global missionaries. Prospect's Dave Corey is driving the truck from Hofstra, site of the NYAC Annual Conference, to Mission Central in Mechanicsburg with all of the Health Kits collected, as he did last year.

■ Church School News



SPRING

Make this beautiful craft to remind you of God's gift of new life at springtime.



What you need:

- White 11" x 17" paper
- Acrylic paint (various spring colors, including green)
- Paintbrush
- Empty two-liter plastic bottle
- Paper plates
- Paper towels

What you do:

1. With the paper placed vertically, paint stems and leaves with green paint.
2. Pour a different color of paint onto a paper plate. Then place the bottom of the bottle into the paint.
3. Using the bottle as a stamp, press it onto the paper to create a flower atop a green stem.
4. Repeat with different colors on different plates, cleaning the bottle each time, to create a beautiful spring bouquet.
