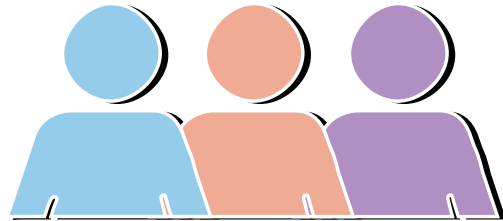

■ Trick-Or-Treat For UNICEF

On October 25th, during fellowship hour, our Sunday School students dressed up in their Halloween costumes and went table-to-table trick-or-treating for UNICEF. The kids collected \$181 that will go to UNICEF to help save and protect children who struggle to survive and thrive, with programs that provide health care, clean water, education and emergency relief.



“Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF” was born when a family in Pennsylvania started a nationwide movement by collecting change in decorated milk cartons on Halloween to help children left vulnerable by World War II. Since then, children have gone door-to-door with their UNICEF collection boxes on Halloween, calling out “Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF!” They have raised more than \$175 million for the U.S. Fund for UNICEF over the past 65 years.
