

We Will Be Healed!

"He was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed." (Isaiah 53:5)

This winter was colder than any other year, and there was more snow and many natural disasters. Not only in the U.S., but also all over the world suffered from many disasters due to global warming and strange climate. In the southern part of Texas, snowstorms and cold waves have left more than 3 million people suffering from cold weather due to electricity and water shortages in the first 100 years. Not only people but also animals in the sea are on the verge of freezing to death due to the cold weather.



It snowed in the Sahara Desert for the first time in history, and glaciers melted in the Himalayas, killing and hurting many people. The cause of many of these natural disasters is human greed and selfishness that destroyed nature. We are being compensated for the sins we have committed.

Easter Egg Trees



We primarily know of Louis C. Tiffany as the stained glass artist, but a 2019 article for Atlas Obscura by Anne Ewbank on the History of the Easter Egg Tree, reveals his connection to another instance of artistry:

"In the spring of 1895 Louis C. Tiffany, of stained-glass and jewelry fame, held a lavish 'Mayflower Festival' to benefit a local hospital. 'Among the evening's entertainments,' writes culinary historian Cathy K. Kaufman, 'was an Easter egg tree, dazzling with different colored eggs.'

"This wasn't unusual at the time. In the era before plastic eggs, many Americans carefully emptied whole eggs of their contents and colored them brightly for Easter, occasionally hanging them on tree branches with scraps of ribbon or thread. In 1890s New York, it was even something of a craze. But despite brief bursts of popularity, Kaufman writes, today 'egg trees are a dismal failure when compared to Christmas trees, found only in a few public fora and very scattered homes.'

"Much like the Christmas tree, the custom likely came to the United States

with German immigrants, entrenching itself among the Pennsylvania Dutch. (Although the Easter egg tree is typically a bare-branched tree hung with eggs, rather than an evergreen.) Across parts of Pennsylvania and Appalachia, Kaufman writes, women considered egg trees a type of good-luck charm, especially when it came to fertility."

Notes of Interest

Paying it back — and forward

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a cross-generational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic assistance for relatives of people who'd helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning "In each other's shadows the people live."

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus' Golden Rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?
