

Change Your Clothes

As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. (Galatians 3:27)

Each of the trees in the autumn forest are changing into beautiful colored clothes. Just like taking out new clothes that were hidden deep in the closet to leave for a long time, every tree in the forest in autumn changes into new clothes to leave their trees. Also, due to the cool weather in the morning and evening, I need to put thin clothes in the closet and take out long sleeves. The temperat



To be a child of God is to change clothes. Just as Adam and Eve change into strong leather clothes given by God, which can withstand the world, instead of thin clothes made of wood leaves, taking off the clothes they were wearing and changing into clothes worn by God is to be God's children.

St. Paul said this into "dressed in Christ" in Galatians 3:27. Let's change into Jesus' clothes in the fall when the beautiful autumn leaves begin to dye. There are two kinds of clothes in the world. One is your own clothes that you made, and the other is the clothes of the prince or the princes of heaven woven and worn by God with the blood of Jesus. When we move on to God, only one piece of clothing is possible. No matter how colorful and cool other clothes look, they are not acceptable to God. However, no matter how humble you may be, God accepts you in the clothes of "Jesus" as your holy and lovely son and daughter. Because this clothing is made of God's lowering and abandonment, blood, sweat, and tears. Just as God changed the leaves leaving silently behind the hard work of midsummer into beautiful clothes, he dressed your children, who rely on God's arms from the world, Jesus, the most beautiful clothes in the world.

Now is the time to change back into Christ's clothes. Last summer, you worked hard in the world and wore the clothes of the world, but I hope you change into the clothes of Christ given by the Lord and start anew.

Recently Jill Wilson and I met with our Missionary Helen Camarce via Zoom for an update on her Mission work in Cambodia. Jill has had an on-going relationship with Helen since she is Prospect's Missions representative and has



gone on many work projects with other NYAC volunteers.

For members who have not previously known of Helen Camarce or had forgotten the valuable work she does, Jill updates us on her work in Cambodia:

"As you may recall, we have a Covenant Relationship with Helen. When we made that commitment, which we have had since 2014, we agreed to support her through prayer, communications, connection and financial support. Recently Kathy Dube and I had a delightful conversation with her on Zoom.



"Helen is still working daily at her office in Cambodia. She expresses deep gratitude for our prayers support. During the pandemic, these connections have helped sustain her. She feels connected to us! Her children and grandchildren currently are in Philippines, and her mom and sister are in NJ. But she is grateful for a Filipino couple living with her who has become her surrogate family. She has found creative ways to utilize technology to worship with family abroad, hold leadership trainings, and seminars which keep her work moving forward. Helen says Cambodia has done a good job with vaccine distributions and she and everyone (all 10) in the UMC office where she works have received a vaccine and stayed healthy."
