"Cast the Net to the Right Side!"


He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many." (John 21:6)

Hallelujah!

Jesus is risen! Easter is already over, but every Sunday is Easter Sunday. The word "resurrection" means dying and then coming back to life. It's a hope for us to come back to life. Being able to start over again gives us courage. It's often said, "If only I were 10 years younger." People in their 50s say, "If I'm in my 40s." People in their 60s say, "Even if you're in your 50s." A 70-year-old pastor said, "Even if I was younger 10 years, I would plant a new church."

We want to start over, but we give up before reality. There are many reasons for health, age, finance, and environmental reasons. Jesus' disciples were also anxious after Jesus was caught. They gathered in one place, couldn't speak loudly, and they were hiding with their breath. They locked the door, and they couldn't walk around because they were scared. Also, witnessing the death of Jesus, the two disciples were leaving Jerusalem and heading to their hometown of Emmaus helplessly. But Jesus showed them and talked with each other. After hearing Jesus' words, the two disciples became warm-hearted. Now they were no longer on their way home. Their steps went back to Jerusalem, filled with hopes and dreams of a new beginning of faith.

The other disciples returned to their hometown of Galilee and went fishing again on a boat. They threw nets all night, but they couldn't catch anything and were in despair. But the resurrected Jesus came. Jesus said to them, "Cast the net to the right side. And you will find some." Jesus didn't say that they would catch more fish than they did in the past, but some. But when they threw the net to the



right side according to his word, they caught 153 fish. St. John wrote down the number of fish in the Bible because they caught so many fish like a miracle. Peter and his disciples met the resurrected Jesus and had new hope.

Life without Jesus is still dark and hopeless. No matter how many times you throw, you get empty-handed. However, if you rely on Jesus' words and throw a net, you can get unexpected results. Easter is the new beginning of our lives and churches.

On May 1, 2022, the Global Methodist Church left our UMC and started a new church. I feel heartbroken at the news of the split of the same church. But let's bless the new church which leaves with new hope. And with their new start, let's reaffirm the essence and identity of our faith and throw the net again into the new vision. 
■ Fun In the Sun
