## **Message from Pastor**

#### 'Move Forward!'

"Brothers and sisters, I do not consider that I have laid hold of it, but one thing I have laid hold of: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:13-14)



My dear brothers and sisters,

Grace and peace to you all!

Autumn has come to the door. The weather has cooled down in the morning and evening, so you can feel it with your skin. I'm already starting to miss summer thinking about winter coming. However, we can welcome winter because the beautiful season of autumn has come. Trees and leaves are changing into beautiful clothes to prepare for the cold winter. We are also putting our summer clothes in the closet and preparing clothes for autumn and winter. We also go shopping to buy clothes for autumn and winter.

We also need to prepare clothes of faith not only for our bodies but also for our souls. Our bodies and minds are mentally and physically exhausted by the long-standing pandemic. Some of our congregation is still suffering from Covid. But you can't just be trapped in the darkness of Covid. We must endure its pain and suffering and overcome it with faith again. But there are still people around us who are still in spiritual sleep even after Covid is over. However, we should not look back on the past, but move forward for a new era.

Recently, some of our church members shared what Carey Nieuwhof wrote that challenged and touched us. The writer's interest was how to respond to the reality after the pandemic. Some reasons why people don't come back to the church after the Pandemic are as follows:

**First conversation after reopening:** "I'm just not comfortable coming back to church until the vaccines are available."

The following month: "Well sure, now I'm vaccinated, but I just don't like wearing masks."

**Month after:** "Yes, the mask mandates are gone, but we're just not comfortable with our kids being exposed right now."


A few weeks later: "Well we haven't travelled in a bit so we'll be away for a while."

Last conversation: "I'm sure we'll be back, we just don't know when."

Meanwhile, on social, you see the same person at football games, house parties, and restaurants every week. Whenever you see shifting logic, it's pretty clear they're not telling you the truth. So, what do we do? Call them out? Argue with them? Call their bluff? Nope, there's no point. Start over and move forward with who's left. His first solution is to focus on the people who stayed, not the people who left. Sure, half our volunteers didn't come back. But some of them did. Some of your donors bailed. But not all of them. And some people left, but others are inviting new people regularly. So ...refocus. Rather than focusing on the people you've lost, focus on the people who stayed.

And then we make our remaining attendees turn into engagers. We've got a crew of attendees who are not yet engaged. Our remaining congregation about moving beyond attendance engage in our ministry. We have to reach out to the church members who don't come to the church and encourage them to come again. Baptize people who need to be baptized. Get people connected into community, into serving, inviting their friends, and giving. In September, we invited the True North Rising Band and had a Benefit Rally Concert and Picnic. We had a lot of joy and fellowship with our friends and families. Some people participated in the Mum Parade Float in town. We, Prospect church, continue to declare that we are still the beacon and hope of the world. Our Days for Girls team started to make apple pies and pumpkin pies every Wednesday to serve African girls in need. It is the greatest joy and honor to participate in God's missionary work. It's the most valuable and meaningful thing in our life.

By the time Jesus died, most people had deserted him. The church started with 11 remaining disciples and a room full of people who didn't leave. And that small group was the genesis of the movement that turned the world upside down. They know what the mission is, they serve in it, and they live it out. They're passionate enough about it to invite their friends. Christians will advance the mission and never stay the same. Yes, only God can bring growth. It's hard to lead people into the future if you're stuck in the past. Let's move forward. I pray that we don't give up in the middle, move forward and become a game changer.

On Sunday, October 30, during fellowship hour, our Sunday School students will be dressed in their Halloween costumes and trick-or-treating for UNICEF!




