Message from Pastor

Season of Thanksgiving and Sharing Has Come!

"Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap, for the measure you give will be the measure you get back." (Luke 6:38)

Dear friends!

I like the season of fall the most out of the year. The leaves turn indescribably beautiful, and the weather is good for a walk. It is also the season when Thanksgiving and Christmas are approaching. Just as trees and mountains turn into different colors and some flowers bloom and some flowers float, we are changing. The type of clothes we wear changes. Sleep time also changes. The days are getting shorter and we had to turn the clock back an hour.



Our lives in this season also need to be changed. Autumn is the season when trees and vegetables bear fruit. And they're willing to share their fruit. Therefore, autumn is a season that gives out abundantly. The church resumes the potluck that it has stopped from the last week of November. You prepare your favorite food and share it together to taste the feast of heavenly banquet. The Days for Girls team is making and selling apple and pumpkin pies. They are raising funds for poor girls and women in Africa. Sunday School does Trick or Treat for UNICEF. It is to share Jesus' love to every child living in conflict around the world. In less than three months, 7.7 million people were internally displaced and more than 6.4 million people — including nearly two-thirds of all children in Ukraine, at a rate of one child every second — had crossed into Poland, Romania, Moldova, Slovakia, Hungary and other neighboring countries. They will have access to safe water, nutrition, health care, education and protection. Our little devotion saves many lives.

Recently, I read about the history of the United Methodist Church and found a very moving story. On June 25, 1950, at 4 a.m., North Korea under Communist rule invaded South Korea with Soviet-made tanks. Three days after the war broke out, the South Korean capital, Seoul, fell, and less than a month later, 90 percent of the South was occupied by North Korean troops, except for small parts of the South. Then, when the UN heard this news, it dispatched troops in a hurry.

The United Methodist Church opposed sending soldiers against war, but instead sent many Methodist Chaplains to the Korean War. And the United Methodist Church launched a nationwide Trick or Treat for UNICEF movement to help orphans and widowed people in the war ... for widows and orphans who lost their husbands and

their fathers due to the war, the Methodist Church set up a "Care Center for Mother and Children" to take care of them. My mother-in-law lost her father because of the war and she stayed with her younger brother and sisters. She lived there and sewed and she supported one younger brother and three younger sisters for their college. His younger brother became a Methodist pastor, one sister became a nurse and all became faithful Christians.

In this abundant season of sharing, I hope to participate in the activities of sharing and become good neighbors who save dying lives and multiply beautiful fruits.
