

- bandaids (travel)

- antacid packet (travel)
- razor
- deodorant (travel)
- wipes or hand sanitizer (travel)
- toothbrush.
- toothpaste (travel)
- brush or comb
- feminine hygiene products.

Each church is collecting 30 of each item needed. Don Orcutt and Gary Gladu are our representatives to the Central CT Parish. The deadline is June 4.






Church Member Reflects On Norway Conference By Corey Nagle

[Editor's Note: Corey Nagle, one of Prospect's Lay Servants, was one of three co-presenters at a Conference in Trondheim, Norway, in mid-February of a paper seeking to help students improve writing about science. The paper was presented at a Writing Research Across Borders (WRAB) Conference. Corey collaborated with two professors, Dr. Sally Drew at Sacred Heart University and Dr. Jeffrey Thomas at CCSU. He was accompanied on the trip by his wife Johanna and daughter Ella.]

"After relatively smooth travel, we arrived in Trondheim, Norway, on Friday, February 24th. We were thankful for only a slight delay leaving Boston that allowed us time to explore Trondheim in the afternoon and evening on Friday. The following Saturday morning kicked off the Writing Research Across Borders (WRAB) Conference with a welcome to Norway and engaging keynote speaker.

"The conference was attended by people from all over the world that came together to share research and discuss the many aspects of writing. On Sunday morning, the research team of which I am a part presented on strategies to teach and improve students' writing in science. We implemented a strategy designed to help students support their claims with evidence when writing an explanation or argument in science, which showed that it aided students in improving their use of evidence and structuring their writing. Our presentation

was well received as we got positive feedback from attendees, including from the opening keynote speaker who attended our presentation. Overall, I was able to learn a lot from the conference, especially since I have not attended a writing conference prior to WRAB in Norway.

"Johanna and Ella had more time to explore the city than I did, but I was able to see some sites. Trondheim was a nice city with scenic views and temperatures that were not too different from a winter day in Connecticut. The city was clean and the people were friendly. We went on a guided morning walk led by some of the conference organizers where we crossed the "Bridge of Happiness." On our own we also saw the Nidaros Cathedral, visited the NTNU Vitenskapsmuseet (Viking Museum) and Trondheim Maritime Museum, and sampled several local restaurants. Johanna and Ella saw even more during the days when I was attending the conference.

"Overall, the trip was enjoyable and educational. We appreciate the prayers and support of everyone as we traveled. The next steps involve finishing a paper on our research and submitting it for publication. If anyone is interested, I will keep you informed of the process as the research team works toward that goal. Again, thank you for all of your prayers and support!"


